Chairman Pitts called the meeting to order at 10:00 A.M.

A motion to accept the minutes of the June 28, 2016 meeting was moved Mr. Gang, seconded by Mr. LaPointe and adopted.

SEWER DISTRICT – Joe Brilling, Executive Director Sewer District, addressed the following item:

- State and Municipal Facilities Program (SAM) Grant Application – The Sewer District is applying for another grant in an effort to close the funding gap for the sewer project that they applied for last year and were awarded \$1M. So they are applying for another \$1M through the State Municipal Facilities Program (SAM grant) and that application is due as soon as possible. He is requesting committee approval to apply for that grant. A motion to approve Sewer District applying for State and Municipal Facilities Program grant was moved by Mr. O'Brien and seconded by Mr. Gang. Discussion. The Treasurer asked about a local match. Mr. Brilling stated it all depends on how the grants flush out. He stated up to \$150,000 might be the leftover remaining gap. If they get everything they are applying for then there won't be any. There is no local match associated with this grant application specifically. The motion to approve Sewer District applying for State and Municipal Facilities Program grant was moved by Mr. O'Brien, seconded by Mr. Gang and adopted.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS – Steve Haskins, Superintendent of Public Works, addressed the following items with the committee, packet of handouts distributed, attached:

- 2017 Proposal for Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day – He asked if the committee was interested in having him include in his 2017 budget request funding for a household hazardous waste collection day. Warren County recently held a collection day at a cost of \$20,000 and they have submitted through a grant with DEC for 50% of that cost. There is a process to go through if the County wanted to apply for a grant and he does not have the

specifics on that today. They do receive calls and have looked into disposal of e-waste and there is no requirement that the government does this, it has been put back on the manufacturers. Meeting handouts included a listing of Registered Covered Electronic Equipment Manufacturers and their Brand(s), attached. The State is requiring these companies to take these items back. Mr. Hicks does not recommend getting back into the garbage/recycling business. Discussion ensued. This collection day would be through a DEC approved contractor. A motion to include Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day in 2017 budget request was moved by Mr. Shaw and Chairman Pitts stated he would second for discussion. Discussion. Chairman Pitts stated the Superintendent is looking for guidance on whether or not to include in 2017 budget request. Treasurer stated if you plan to do this suggesting the possibility of using some of the Solid Waste fund balance which has a balance of \$267,000. Don't put it in his 2017 budget to just have it removed later. He feels this is an appropriate use of fund balance. Chairman Pitts stated lets plan to put this in the 2017 budget and take a look at it come budget time.

- Discuss Bridge Yellow Flag Engineering Services – Currently have seven bridges with yellow flags. His 2016 budget included funds in the engineering services line to address some of these yellow flags. He picked three of the yellow flag bridges and went out for quotes to address these. Quotes were received from Maser, C & S and GPI, quotes listed on attached handout. He would like to move forward with C&S on two of these yellow flag bridges. The three bridges are: Bin #33005810 is bridge on 153 out by Vermont border, Bin #33006450 is the Shushan bridge, and Bin #33006370 is Co. Rt. 61 over Battenkill in Battenville. They did have a red flag on the Shushan bridge last week which required a twenty-four hour fix or close. It was fixed within the twenty-four hours. Because the Shushan bridge is on the TIP for a super structure replacement and also applying for a complete replacement under Bridge New York he does not know if we need to spend the money to repair a yellow flag if we are successful in getting funding to replace. He would like to move forward on BIN#33005810 and BIN#33006370 with C & S. He is requesting approval to work with the County Attorney to get a professional services agreement in place to have C & S design those repairs for us. A motion to authorize the Superintendent to work with the County Attorney on a professional services agreement with C & S to design repairs for two yellow flagged bridges, BIN#33005810 and BIN#33006370 was moved by Mr. LaPointe, seconded by Mr. Gang and adopted.
- Discuss Proposed Army Corp of Engineering Ruling Change – handout attached. Superintendent will draft a letter to submit for the Chairman to sign commenting on these rule changes.
- Discuss Town of Salem Resolution – Archibald St. Bridge – The Town of Salem passed a resolution to let the county know that they would like to begin the process of looking at how we would take the bridge out. Resident who are vocal about taking the bridge out come to the town meetings and those who want to keep the bridge do not attend. Asking the County to begin the process of looking at what would be involved in taking out the bridge. Chairman Pitts stated Superintendent Haskins advised him that when the village put the water system in they drilled through the abutments to run the water pipes under the stream and then when they put the new bridge in they just poured concrete over the old abutments making it a monumental task to figure out how to re-run the water lines again. He asked the Superintendent to begin the process to do it and knows the Army Corps of Engineers and DEC would be involved. He advised the residents that this could take a year or more. This is a village water line that feeds the community. Mr. Pitts stated there is nothing the matter with the water system. Mr. O'Brien stated it was his understanding that the County has grant money to take the deck off only not the abutments. Chairman Pitts stated we have money to do it if the State will allows us to take

the abutments out. The original money allocated was to take the deck out. Mr. Hicks stated the study indicated eight other things beyond taking the deck out that would make a difference all the way through. He stated all you can ask the County to authorize is what the money was given to us for which is take the deck out. He stated that has been the discussion point from the very beginning. He asked if that is the resolution the town passed asking the County to do that and Chairman Pitts responded correct but added the County has money to take the abutments out also but have to have permission to use that. The cost to remove the abutments with the water line is unknown. Mr. Campbell suggested closing the bridge for six months to a year to see what it is like without it while we are going through all of this. Chairman Pitts stated the essence of taking it out is to reduce the flooding. Mr. Campbell stated keep going through the process of what needs to be done just find out the real outcry from residents by the bridge being closed. The County Administrator agreed with Mr. Campbell. Chairman Pitts stated that is not the point of taking the deck and the bridge out; it is to reduce the flooding. Mr. Skellie stated the bridge was replaced eight or ten years ago and closed then so the community knows the impact. Mr. Haff stated the foot and a half difference in water with taking the deck off makes a big difference. Mr. Hicks asked the Superintendent if there is any reason taking the deck out and abutments has to be one project or could the deck come out and later on if approval is given take the abutments out. It could be done separately. He stated the only thing on the table right now is taking the deck out because that is all we have permission to do. Mr. Pitts stated for the foot and a half difference in water is with the removal of both the deck and abutments. He stated if you take the deck out without the abutments you have really not accomplished anything. Superintendent Haskins stated that would widen the channel. The Town of Salem does not plan to contribute to this project because Chairman Pitts stated that is what we received the grant money for. Mr. Henke added there are all kinds of other aspects to this issue like the water line. Chairman Pitts stated they have not gotten that far yet. The town board's decision was to forward this request on and ask the County DPW to begin to look at removing the bridge. Superintendent Haskins stated we will need to go through a SEQRA process. Chairman Pitts stated he believes the water line issue was unknown when they did the study. To lower the water by a foot and half other things need to be done besides removing the deck. Superintendent Haskins stated Alternate 3 & 3A in the study. The County Attorney explained the south abutment will be left in place to accommodate a future pedestrian crossing but the north abutment will be removed to widen the floodway. The overflow box culvert would be installed on the north bank would require an easement from the property owner to create an overflow channel. The Superintendent stated it is the deck and the north abutment. A motion to remove deck was moved by Mr. Campbell and seconded by Mr. Haff. Discussion. County forces could take the deck out; approximately a week to two weeks. Mr. Campbell stated his motion was just to remove the deck and have County forces remove the deck after paving season during our so called make work time. Mr. Gang concurred. Superintendent Haskins does not think we will have enough time to get through the permit process within that time frame. Mr. Henke stated DEC approval should be quick; deck is above the water line, does not touch the bed or the banks. Mr. Shaw suggested we should receive a copy of the resolution or a letter from the Town of Salem requesting to take the deck out. He also suggested the County put signs up immediately stating deck is coming off by order (resolution) of the Town of Salem. Superintendent Haskins asked if the committee would like him to reach out to Fitzgerald and ask them to model it in such a way that the deck is gone, and the abutments stay and see what that translates into as far as a ten year flood reduction. He possibly would have an answer by the Finance Committee. It would probably involve some money, probably not a lot. The Treasurer stated the grant funds have to be used

by year end. Discussion regarding a possible grant extension. Mr. Hicks stated if the Town of Salem wants the deck out lets support them. The motion to remove the deck on the Archibald Street bridge using County forces after the completion of the paving season was moved by Mr. Campbell and seconded by Mr. Haff. Mr. Campbell stated only use County forces if it was less that what an outside contractor would charge. Discussion. A motion to amend based on getting a grant extension to cover that cost was moved by Mr. O'Brien, seconded by Messrs. Campbell and Shaw and adopted. The motion to remove the deck on the Archibald Street bridge using County forces after the completion of the paving season was moved by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. Haff and adopted as amended. A motion to allow Superintendent Haskins to apply for any permits and declare us lead agency for any SEQRA was moved by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mrs. Fedler and adopted. Public Works will pay for the model for the impact of just removing the deck which is needed for SEQRA. The County Attorney stated the Superintendent of Public Works needs to find someone with experience doing a SEQRA for a project like this. A motion to have the Public Works Superintendent come back to committee with quotes/RFP for completion of a SEQRA and permits/other studies was moved by Ms. Fedler and seconded by Mr. O'Brien. Discussion. The cost for the SEQRA is unknown at this time. Chairman Pitts stated there is \$193,000 left in the grant and it is anticipated to cost about \$55,000 to take the deck out. The motion to have the Public Works Superintendent come back to committee with quotes/RFP for completion of a SEQRA and permits/other studies was moved by Ms. Fedler, seconded by Mr. O'Brien and adopted.

- Paving Project Updates – Spreadsheet attached. Paving is 70% complete; 19.97 miles completed out of 28.65. They have made some changes from last year and the guys are doing great.
- Request for Resolution to Recognize Pave NY Funds – A motion to amend budget recognizing Pave NY funds in the amount of \$442,905.81 was moved by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. Gang and adopted.
- Request for Vehicle Donation – Sheriff's SUV – FE Rescue Squad – The Superintendent stated they have received various requests for vehicles; towns of Dresden, Salem, Fort Edward Rescue Squad. Mr. Moore, Supervisor Town of Fort Ann, stated a request for a vehicle for the Fort Ann Rescue Squad was discussed at yesterday's Public Safety Committee meeting. The County Administrator stated this same situation came up yesterday at the Public Safety Committee meeting and a couple of different things were discussed and he thought the outcome of the committee was to bring this issue to the Public Works Committee because car pool is managed under the Department of Public Works. It was discussed yesterday that under the new car pool scheme the County is ending the practice of giving old cars to municipalities. The County used to give the cars to the towns for one dollar. That was part of the former County Administrator's scheme under the new car pool we can no longer afford to do that. The County Administrator suggested yesterday that the County could take the cars that are surplus offer them to the towns to bid on first establishing some kind of minimum or just put all the cars to auction and the towns could bid at the general auction just like everyone else. He stated his take from the Public Safety Committee meeting was that the County was going to take the general auction option. All cars would go to auction and if the towns want to bid then they can. Mr. O'Brien stated we had a policy before that excess graders, etc. would be auction off first to the towns and asked if we want to make that consistent whether it is machinery or cars. Superintendent Haskins stated he presented that proposal at a committee last year but it never went to the full Board for approval. Mr. Campbell stated they are different, one is

machinery – Highway equipment and the cars are in the Car Pool fund. He stated they are totally different and we can handle the highway equipment different than the vehicles. He agreed with the County Administrator that the vehicles should go straight to auction; what is fair for one, is fair for all. A motion that DPW follows the Public Safety decision to put cars from the car pool up for auction was moved by Mrs. Fedler, seconded by Mr. Campbell and adopted.

- Summer Conference in Saratoga – NYS County Superintendents of Highways Association – A motion to approve Superintendent and Deputy Superintendent attending NYS County Superintendents of Highways Association summer conference in Saratoga, no overnight accommodations included, was moved by Mr. LaPointe, seconded by Mr. Gang and adopted.
- BOCES thanked the County for the donation of welding rods.
- Business Cards – A motion to approve outside printing of business cards for the Deputy Superintendent of Public Works approximately \$20 to \$30 was moved by Mr. LaPointe, seconded by Mrs. Fedler and adopted.

OTHER BUSINESS: None.

The meeting adjourned at 11:24 A.M.

### **III. FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQs)**

#### **Who is eligible for funding?**

Only municipalities are eligible to apply for and receive State assistance under this Program. Under this State assistance program, a municipality is any:

- County, City, Town, or Village,
- Local Public Authority or Public Benefit Corporation,
- School District or Supervisory District, or
- Native American tribe or nation located within New York State.

#### **What costs are eligible?**

All costs must be reasonable and necessary, as determined by DEC, for the operation of the HHW Program.

##### **A. Operating Costs - Typical eligible operating expenses are:**

1. Contractor costs to accept, segregate, package, transport and properly manage the collected HHW.
2. Costs of safety equipment, such as protective clothing and respirator cartridges, for municipal workers and volunteers.
3. Costs of packaging supplies and containers for HHW, container labels and ground covers used during the collection of HHW.

**B. Educational Costs -** Educational and outreach activities must focus on educating the public on reducing the volume of HHW generated in the home, or must provide promotion for a HHW collection program. Costs of "mixed-use" brochures/advertisements will be pro-rated only if a minimum of 50% of the materials are dedicated to HHW information. Typical eligible educational expenses are:

1. Costs of preparing and printing posters, brochures, flyers, and other materials that focuses on HHW collection programs;
2. Costs of purchasing advertising space in newspapers or other periodicals, or of providing public service announcements to local radio stations or other media.

#### **Are there any other requirements for funding?**

1. Permitted HHW Collection and Storage Facilities must have a valid DEC permit to operate.
2. Collection day programs must have received DEC's written approval prior to conducting the collection day.
3. Educational costs will be eligible for reimbursement only if the municipality offers a collection program for HHW.

### **Which types of wastes are eligible for reimbursement?**

Only the costs of collecting and managing categories of wastes that meet the definition of HHW and do not have separate State or federally mandated take-back, deposit or product stewardship programs, will be reimbursed under this program. Categories of waste potentially eligible for reimbursement may include, but are not limited to:

*Pesticides, corrosives, pool chemicals, driveway sealers, hazardous paints and stains, polishes and waxes, adhesives, solvents, hazardous cleaning products, antifreeze, vehicle fluids, fluorescent light tubes, compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs) and ballasts, photography chemicals, non-rechargeable hazardous batteries, products containing mercury (\*excluding thermostats), propane gas cylinders (that still contain propane).*

*\*For information on thermostat disposal, or to participate in the Thermostat Recycling Corporation program, go to <http://www.thermostat-recycle.org>. For more on managing mercury thermostats, go to <http://www.dec.ny.gov/chemical/92655.html>.*

### **What costs are NOT eligible?**

Items that will NOT be reimbursed under this program include, but are not limited to:

1. Costs that are reimbursed to the municipality or paid by outside sources, such as State and Federal Governments, or private donations or funding;
2. In-kind services, employee salaries, general supplies and overhead;
3. Costs paid outside the term of the contract;
4. Costs of issuing bonds, obtaining financing, obtaining permits, applying for State assistance, interest, bid document production or bid document distribution;
5. Cost of recycling waste materials if the recycled product is returned to the municipality, such as through a "buy-back" system;
6. Costs of operating a fluorescent bulb collection program or other similar single material collection programs, unless collected as part of an approved HHW collection program;
7. Costs of any HHW collection program that does not comply with an approved collection day plan or facility permit, and all applicable rules and regulations;
8. Cost of managing hazardous waste not generated by households, such as hazardous waste generated by municipalities, municipal departments, State agencies, schools, farms commercial establishments or industries.;
9. Costs related to and for municipal workers and volunteers except for personal safety equipment (e.g., salary, overhead, travel and medical expenses);
10. Costs incurred from the collection, handling, and disposal of types of solid waste that, except under extraordinary circumstances, would not meet the definition of HHW (e.g., explosives, alkaline batteries, ammunition, asbestos, bulk metal,

construction and demolition debris, empty containers, empty paint cans, empty aerosol cans, empty refrigerant cans, empty propane tanks, unserviceable extinguishers, household medical waste, latex paint, radioactive material, rechargeable batteries, smoke detectors, tires, used oil, white goods, roll-off containers with municipal solid waste, and any miscellaneous materials and packaging received).

#### **Are the costs of collecting electronics eligible?**

No. Municipalities have no responsibility under the **New York State Electronic Equipment Recycling and Reuse Act**. In fact, a key purpose of the Act was to remove the burden and expense of managing costly electronic waste acceptance programs from municipalities, and introduce a producer responsibility approach to managing this expanding waste stream.

Instead of requiring municipal collection, the law requires manufacturers of Covered Electronic Equipment (CEE) to provide all counties of the State, and all municipalities which have a population of ten thousand or greater, with at least one convenient method of recycling. Manufacturers and/or collective electronic waste acceptance programs may make arrangement with municipalities to operate electronic waste acceptance programs.

As of **April 1, 2011**, when electronic waste acceptance programs were required to be implemented, costs for municipal collection of CEE were no longer eligible for reimbursement through the Household Hazardous Waste State Assistance Program. Municipalities participating in an electronic waste acceptance program might be able to receive some form of financial assistance through their agreements with those programs.

#### **Are the costs of collecting rechargeable batteries eligible?**

No. Municipalities have no responsibility under the **NYS Rechargeable Battery Recycling Act**. The law requires manufacturers of covered rechargeable batteries to collect and recycle the batteries statewide in a manufacturer-funded program at no cost to consumers or municipalities. Most rechargeable batteries contain toxic metals that can be released into the environment when improperly disposed. As of June 8, 2011, consumers across the state have been able to safely return to retailers rechargeable batteries, from a large number of electronic products, for recycling or proper management at the end of their useful life. Rechargeable batteries covered under the law include: *Nickel-cadmium, sealed lead, lithium ion, nickel metal hydride, any other such dry cell battery capable of being charged and battery packs containing any of the above-mentioned batteries.*

Since retailers that sell covered rechargeable batteries are required to accept used rechargeable batteries from consumers during normal business hours, cost for municipal collection of rechargeable batteries covered under the act are no longer eligible for reimbursement through the Household Hazardous Waste State Assistance Program.



## Corps Releases Proposal to Modify and Reissue Clean Water Act Nationwide Permits

On June 1, 2016, the US Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) published a proposal to reissue and modify the nationwide permits (NWP). 81 Fed. Reg. 35,186 (Jun. 1, 2016) (Proposed Rule). To comply with the Clean Water Act (CWA), projects with minimal adverse environmental effects can obtain authorization for the discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States through the Corps' streamlined NWP process. NWPs authorize such activities as utility line installation (including pipelines and electrical transmission), agricultural production, industrial development and general maintenance. With the current permits set to expire on March 18, 2017, the Corps proposes to reissue all 50 of the NWPs with some revisions, issue two new permits, revise some of the general conditions (GCs) and add a new GC. Comments must be submitted within 60 days of publication or by August 1, 2016.

In recent years the Corps, on average, authorized over 30,000 projects through the NWP program.<sup>1</sup> The reissuance process, therefore, attracts significant attention from non-governmental organizations and industry, alike. It is expected that some groups will file comments raising concerns that the NWP approval process does not adequately address impacts to natural resources, and more specifically to endangered species.<sup>2</sup> It will be important, therefore, for regulated entities to file strong comments illustrating the significance of NWPs to their industry and paying particular attention to the aspects of the Proposed Rule highlighted below.

### Key Aspects of the Proposed Rule

- **Acreeage Limits and Pre-Construction Notice Thresholds.** The Corps seeks comment on whether to increase or decrease the acreage limits and pre-construction notification (PCN) thresholds for several permits, including NWPs 12 (Utility Line Activities), 14 (Linear Transportation Projects), 51 and 52 (Land- and Water-Based Renewable Energy Generation Facilities).<sup>3</sup> The Corps requests that recommendations to increase or decrease the acreage limits be accompanied by data demonstrating why the change is warranted.
- **Waters of the United States (WOTUS) Rule.** The proposal makes little mention of the implications of increased jurisdiction under the new WOTUS rule (e.g., with respect to ditches and other features). An increase in jurisdiction under the new rule will mean that activities that previously required no CWA authorization may now need permits, and that some activities that previously qualified for NWPs may no longer be able to meet the acreage thresholds. The Corps is soliciting comment on how the WOTUS rule "might affect the applicability and efficiency of the proposed NWPs."

- **Compliance with Endangered Species Act.** The Corps stands by its prior position that the issuance of the NWP does not necessitate consultation under Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act (ESA) because promulgation of the rule itself has “no effect” on listed species.
- **Information Collection Requirements.** The White House Office of Management and Budget (OMB) seeks comment on the accuracy of the Corps’ estimate of the burden of the information collection requirements in the Proposed Rule. The Proposed Rule states that comments to OMB would be most effective if submitted within 30 days, or around July 1.
- **Appropriate Scope of Cumulative Effects Analysis.** The Corps properly recognizes that its scope of analysis is limited to the activities authorized by an NWP, e.g., the discharge of dredged or fill material. The language in the Proposed Rule is intended to counter any arguments raised by non-governmental organizations that a broader analysis that goes beyond the Corps’ regulatory jurisdiction and control is required.

#### **Key Revisions to Existing Nationwide Permits and Two New Permits**

- **NWP 3 – Maintenance.** The Corps proposes to amend the permit to authorize *removal* of structures or fills in jurisdictional waters and to clarify that NWP 3 authorizes the use of temporary (swamp) mats in jurisdictional waters when the mats are used to minimize impacts during maintenance activities.
- **NWP 12 – Utility Line Activities.** The Corps proposes to amend the permit to authorize inadvertent returns of drilling fluids (or “frac-outs”) that can occur during directional drilling operations to install utility lines below jurisdictional waters. The Corps also proposes to clarify that NWP 12 does not authorize the construction, maintenance or repair of utility lines, but instead “only authorizes those components of utility lines” where the activity is under the Corps’ jurisdiction.
- **NWP 13 – Bank Stabilization.** The Corps proposes to clarify that the permit authorizes a wide variety of stabilization measures including structural measures, such as bulkheads, as well as vegetative techniques (e.g., bioengineering).
- **NWP 21 – Surface Coal Mining Activities.** The Corps proposes to change the terms of the permit to clarify that all activities, even those previously authorized under the 2007 NWP 21, are subject to the half-acre limit for losses of non-tidal waters, a 300 linear foot limit for losses of stream bed and a prohibition of discharges for the construction of valley fills.
- **NWP 33 – Agricultural Activities.** The Corps is not proposing any changes to this NWP but is soliciting comments on whether any further clarification of this permit is necessary.
- **NWP 44 – Mining Activities.** The Corps proposes to change the terms of the permit to clarify that the loss of non-tidal wetlands and the mined area in open non-tidal waters, together, may not exceed a half acre.
- **NWP A – Authorize Removal of Low-Head Dams.** This new permit would authorize the removal of smaller structures “built across a stream to pass flows from upstream over the entire width of the dam crest on an uncontrolled basis.”
- **NWP B – Authorize Construction and Maintenance of Living Shorelines.** The Corps intends to compliment NWP 13 with this new permit, which offers a wider variety of shoreline stabilization and erosion control measures.

**Key Revisions to NWP General Conditions and One New Condition:**

- **GC 16 – Wild and Scenic Rivers.** The Corps proposes to modify the GC to require PCN for any NWP activity that will occur in a component of the National Wild and Scenic River System or in a river designated as a “study river” for possible inclusion in the system.
- **GC 19 – Migratory Birds and Bald and Golden Eagles.** The Corps proposes to modify the GC to state that the permittee is responsible for ensuring compliance with the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act.
- **GC 23 – Mitigation.** The Corps proposes to clarify that if the district engineer determines the adverse environmental effects of the proposed activity will be more than minimal, the applicant may 1) apply for an individual permit or 2) prepare a mitigation proposal to reduce effects to no more than minimal.
- **Proposed GC 31 – Activities Affecting Structures Built by the United States.** This new condition addresses compliance with Rivers and Harbors Act § 408, which requires Corps approval before structures or works built by the United States are altered, occupied or used.

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
