Chairman Suprenant called the meeting to order at 10:00 A.M.

A motion to accept minutes of the July 25, 2016 meeting was moved by Ms. Idleman, seconded by Mr. Hogan and adopted.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS /REQUESTS:

ALTERNATIVE SENTENCING – Mike Gray, Director, addressed the following items with the committee:

- Program Updates:
  - Community Service:

- Fair – Collected just under 20,000 bottles/cans, four tons of cardboard and other miscellaneous items.
- Cemeteries – continue to mow and wrapping up for the season.
- Painting projects – waiting for bucket truck to be freed up to finish painting projects.
- Permission for overnight stay on September 21<sup>st</sup>–22<sup>nd</sup> in Syracuse 100% covered by DCJS in relation to Juvenile Justice program opportunity, development of a database of service providers in collaboration with Probation and Warren County. He plans to attend with two other members from our county. A motion to approve overnight stay was moved by Ms. Idleman, seconded by Mr. Shay and adopted.
- Prison tour scheduled for September 7<sup>th</sup> at 12:30 PM – 16 signed up to attend.

PUBLIC DEFENDER – Mike Mercure, Public Defender, addressed the following items with the committee:

- Counsel at First Appearance (CAFA) Updates – continues to move forward. They have done 129 after hours since May, 62 during office hours that were unscheduled, 267 during regular scheduled court appearances for a total of 458 appearances since May 16<sup>th</sup>. Everyone is communicating and working out any issues that arise. A new issue coming up is with the holding facility and how they are going to deal with that and also with the magistrates possibly having jurisdiction countywide for arrangement purposes.
- Caseload Study Update – A caseload study is being conducted in his office for the next few months through Indigent Legal Services through a private contractor, the Rand Corporation. He is working to make the caseload study as effective as it can be.
- Indigent Legal Services Update – Still have distributions 3, 4, 5 and 6 outstanding. This is separate from Hurrell-Herring. That money totals about \$440,000. He is going to inquire on the status of those funds.
- Indigent Parolee Program Renewal of Funds – Reimbursement for work they are doing with state parolees through DCJS. Renewed funding from April 2016 – March 2017. Additional funding for work they are doing.
- Working on backfilling a vacant legal position in the office.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY – Tony Jordan, District Attorney, addressed the following items with the committee:

- Staffing Request and Update on Crime Victim Services Numbers – Requesting to backfill a part time Crime Victim Specialist position that is grant funded due to a resignation; accepted full time job with the State. A motion to recommend backfill and send recommendation to the Personnel Committee for consideration was moved by Ms. Idleman, seconded by Mr. Shay and adopted. In July, the Specialists had 918 contacts with victims. Seeing an increase in cases where victims are also defendants and also seeing this in Warren County. Noted there are significant mental health challenges which are a component of these cases.
- 2015 to 2016 Caseload Comparison – Misdemeanor/felony cases open this year verses last year, we are up 15.5%. It is all across the board.
- Change to Special Prosecutor Procedures – They try to cover cases for Warren County when a Special Prosecutor is needed and Warren County reciprocates. The volume was too great and he has spoken with the Warren County District Attorney. He stated they are looking at contracting with a separate attorney who would handle cases out of our busiest courts. He stated we can use drug forfeiture funds to cover that cost for a few years. We

would only pay for cases in our courts. For example, if the victim is also a defendant, a special prosecutor is needed.

- Code Enforcement - They have prosecuted several cases. The County Attorney stated the goal is compliance not prosecution.
- 2017 Crimes Against Revenue – Received a letter today from DCJS renewing their Crimes Against Revenue grant for 2017 (primarily Medicaid fraud – stealing taxpayer dollars). A motion to accept 2017 Crimes Against Revenue grant funding and forward to the Finance Committee for consideration was moved by Mr. Shay, seconded by Mr. Hogan and adopted.

SHERIFF – Undersheriff Winchell addressed the following items with the committee:

- Request to Recognize Grant Revenue – DCJS for Livescan – They plan to replace the existing livescan equipment in the Sheriff's Department and purchase one for the Salem substation. A motion to accept grant, matching grant using forfeiture funds for our portion – about \$20,000, was moved by Ms. Idleman, seconded by Mr. Hogan and adopted.

PUBLIC SAFETY – Glen Gosnell, Director, addressed the following items with the committee, handout attached:

- Radio System Damage due to Severe Weather - August 12<sup>th</sup> storm. A lightning strike caused about \$7,000 in damage to our radio systems and components at the municipal center. The County Administrator stated we will need to pay out of pocket.
- Hazard Mitigation Plan Update – Notification of Hazard Mitigation Plan grant extension until September 30, 2017. Still waiting on some worksheets from several towns and villages. Surveys for communities have been sent out.
- Radio System RFP Development Update - Doing an inventory of what we have now and what improvements they would like to see to proceed with that RFP. Burch Tower working with engineer, Paul J. Ford, who did the last survey and gathering information on how to proceed to replace the Burch Tower. They might be able to use the same footprint.
- CAD System Project Update – The vendor was on site and hoped to have priority issues addressed. The vendor did not feel the problems were network issues and we have not moved forward with a network audit. His update fixed some stuff but other problems are being experienced and concerns remain with moving forward with this vendor. Mr. Gosnell is very frustrated with this process which has been ongoing for two years. The core team is looking at developing an RFP and doing a search for a vendor. It would take a substantial amount of time and money to replace the system. The committee discussed the ongoing issues with the system and options moving forward.
- Grant Updates:
  - Emergency Management Performance Grant – Completed and closed out FY 13/14/15
  - Homeland Security Program – FY 13/14 closed and FY 15 remains active until 2017.
  - Waiting for PSAP grant award and Interoperable application to be released.
- Mountain Lakes EMS Council Annual Awards Winners – Three recognized:
  - ALS Provider of the Year – Adrienne Hamilton of Cambridge Valley Rescue Squad
  - Betsy Bristol Memorial Award – Bruce Mason, EMS Coordinator
  - Excellence in EMS Quality & Safety – Cambridge Valley Rescue Squad

- July Communications Center Activity Report attached. Total incidents 6052 and telephone traffic 12,079.
- App roll out – Introduced at the Supervisors meeting and at the Washington County Fair. Received a BRAVO in the Post Star.
- Requests for 911 Records – The County Attorney stated it is according to a NY State law that records relating to calls to County 911 Centers are not releasable.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Chairman Suprenant stated that Board Chairman Henke requested consideration of a resolution in regard to Log Bay Day to forward to the full Board, attached. A motion to recommend sending Log Bay Day resolution to the full Board for consideration was moved by Mr. Shay and seconded by Mr. Haff. Discussion. The County Attorney stated Washington County does not control the water and does not own the land because it is State property so we cannot regulate those to any extent. Our part of Log Bay Day is the use of our resources, Sheriff's Department and Public Safety Communications. The motion to recommend sending Log Bay Day resolution to the full Board for consideration was moved by Mr. Shay, seconded by Haff and adopted.

A motion to adjourn was moved by Mr. Hogan, seconded by Mr. Shay and adopted. The meeting adjourned at 2:15 P.M.



## PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MEETING REPORT

August 30, 2016

### • Radio System Issues / Damage due to Storm Activity

- On August 12, 2016 at approximately 4:00 PM, while the Fort Edward (and surrounding) area was experiencing a severe thunderstorm, lightning struck in the imminent vicinity to the municipal center, causing initially a fire alarm activation at Public Health, and shortly thereafter, failure of some of our Public Safety radio systems and components. As a result, the some of the systems suffered approximately \$7,000.00 in unreparable damage to the monitor for the interoperable radio system console, the tower/console interface cards for the law enforcement radios on Burch Hill and Mount Defiance and the tower audio controller for the EMS radio system. Wells Communications responded to the municipal center and all destroyed items were replaced with components available. Due to the issues and use of our on hand components, additional had to be ordered. The county's radio system vendor is standing by on receipt of payment pending advisement of instruction from the County Administrator, reviewing with our insurance policy.

### • Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP) Project Update

- **Grant Extension:** We received notification on August 16, 2016 we were approved for an extension on the grant to finish the project, now expiring September 30, 2017. This extension will allow us the time needed to continue our work with Tetra-Tech and our municipal partners to form a functional, easy to navigate and utilize plan for all involved.
- **Municipal Responses:** If your municipality still has yet to provide their information and feedback, please do so as soon as possible. If you or your personnel need assistance with the project, please let one of us our Tetra-Tech representatives know.
- **Surveys:** Our HMP Project Website has surveys geared towards a number of different members of our communities, everyone's feedback and input are important to the project and are a vital function of creating a functional, comprehensive plan that will work for all involved. ### • Radio System RFP Development – Project Update

- **Radio System:** The RFP for the system is in the final stages of document development, reviewing the requirements and components necessary to accomplish the tasks set forth.
- **Burch Tower Replacement RFP:** Process is in the information gathering stage and we hope to be moving forward soon on development of that document / process.

### • CAD System Project Update

#### • Cushing System Progress

- Core Team group last met on July 25, discussing the current issues with the vendor, department officials involved and the County Administrator. Vendor reported his plan to address the major "Priority 1" issues listed on the outstanding items task list, which he hoped to be resolved prior to the end of September.
- Major application update deployed on August 11, 2016, addressing the memory leaks and communications / applications issues believing to be causing unresponsiveness in some deployments of the applications. Vendor remained on site for 5 days diagnosing and addressing issues found after the update. Some were corrected on site, others (non-urgent) are being worked on.

- Follow Up to Application Update:
  - System Crashes: We have experienced two "lock up" or "crash" type incidents with the system since the update, both of which are being reviewed and have been attributed to issues with "services" on the server at the time of initial review.
  - Spoke Austin Donaghy on Friday (08/26) by phone, he will be following up with us when he returns to the office this week. Austin reported that to date he had not seen any issues matching the prior communications type issues we had been experiencing previously, prompting the prior concern for the network audit.
- **Future of RMS, CAD, Mobile Project Team – Update**
  - Project Team Kick-Off Meeting was held August 9, 2016, with representatives from the Sheriff's Office, Public Safety, Information Technology, County Administration and liaison to the Board, Mr. O'Brien. The group discussed and set forth a plan moving forward and set action items as follows:
    - Identify System Needs / Components (submitted by 08/18)
    - Project Team to Reconvene - 09/02/2016 at 10AM – Will review and discuss future of systems and potential future solutions moving forward.
- **Grant Updates – Closing out FY13 / FY14 / FY15 (EMPG)**
  - **EMPG (Emergency Management Performance Grant):** All projects were completed as planned and is being closed out as of the end of the performance period.
  - **SHSP (Homeland Security Program):** All projects were completed as planned and will be closed out as of the end of the performance period, FY15 SHSP remains active and in progress and does not close until 09/2017.
- **Mountain Lakes EMS Regional Award Winners**
  - The Mountain Lakes Regional EMS Council governs the operation of the EMS agencies in the counties of Warren, Washington, Essex, Franklin and Clinton counties and announced their annual awards. With a number of awardees originating from Washington County again this year, this only continues to prove what an asset we have in our local EMS agencies and personnel! Local awardees are as follows:
    - **ALS Provider of the Year:** Adrienne Hamilton of the Cambridge Valley Rescue Squad
    - **Betsy Bristol Memorial Award:** Bruce Mason, CLI –of Washington County Public Safety / EMS & Fort Ann EMS
    - **Excellence in EMS Quality & Safety:** Cambridge Valley Rescue Squad
- **Monthly PSAP (Communications Center) Activity Report**
  - The PSAP Activity Report for the month of July is attached for review.
- **Emergency Management & Citizen Preparedness Application – Rollout Update**
  - Our mobile application geared towards Emergency Preparedness and Notification was officially released on August 19, 2016 at the Board of Supervisors meeting. Since release, we have received a large amount of positive feedback as to the information contained therein and the capabilities of the application from the palm of your hand. We appreciate the support and efforts of our county officials and fellow department heads, local municipal officials and the Post-Star, all who were essential in helping us inform the members of the public we serve that we have a new option available for them to interact with us, be prepared for emergencies and stay notified.
    - **App Rollout at the Fair:** Director DePalo of the Veterans Services Office and County Clerk Lemery allowed us to co-host our banner and informational cards at their booths at the fair, helping greatly with outreach. We had a number of attendees stop us at the fair to discuss the app, ask some questions and provide feedback.
    - **Questions, encountering issues or need help – let us know!**




